#### **RISING COSTS**

# FROM DORSCONO

With the COVID-19 situation in Singapore stabilised, the Multi-Ministry Taskforce (MTF) has adjusted the Disease Outbreak Response System Condition (DORSCON) level from orange to yellow. This means the easing of community Safe Management Measures (SMMs) as well as the reopening of Singapore borders and facilitating the resumption of travel with the Vaccinated Travel Framework.

However, Co-Chair of the COVID-19 MTF, Mr. Lawrence Wong, reminds us that the pandemic is "certainly not over." He warned that Singapore may have to tighten restrictions and reinstate TraceTogther and SafeEntry if a new variant of concern emerges.

#### Here are some key things to keep in mind:

### Do Not Throw or Delete TraceTogether

The public should not delete their TraceTogether apps or discard their tokens for now. The tokens are government properties and throwing them away could be an offence. People who have lost their tokens will need to replace them. Replacing a token for the first time

is free but costs \$9 for each subsequent replacement.

Singapore may reactivate TraceTogether and SafeEntry if the situation requires it. TraceTogether is also still required for the verification of vaccination status where vaccinated-differentiated safe management measures are in place, such as events with more than 500 participants.

#### **Mask Wearing**

Mask-wearing is only required in indoor settings which include public transport, shopping malls, office buildings, hawker centres, and coffee shops. Masks will be optional (but still encouraged) in outdoor settings which include parks, HDB void decks, bus stops, and bus interchanges.



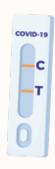
#### SMMs In Place For Vulnerable People

Hospitals and residential care homes may continue to put in place certain SMMs such as pre-registration for visitors and limiting the number of visitors as well as visiting hours to protect vulnerable patients from infection. As a visitor, do check with the hospital or home you are visiting and schedule your visit ahead of time.



#### No more free community ART tests

From 26 Apr onwards, there will be no more free ART tests at Combined Test Centres (CTCs) and Quick Test Centres (QTCs). If you need to take an ART test, you will have to pay for your test available at the CTCs, QTCs, GP Clinics, or via tele-ART providers. You can view the "List of Approved COVID-19 Test Providers" on the Ministry of Health's (MOH) website. For queries, please call MOH's helpline at 6995 9177.

# STAYING ALER

In Singapore, scams have been on the rise, accounting for 42% of all crime in 2020 alone, with losses estimated at \$265 million. To safeguard our monies and defend ourselves against scams, we need to stay vigilant.

One way is by learning more about the types of scams and recognising how they occur. Here are some of the most common scams with tips on how to protect yourself.

#### **Online Purchase Scams**

**How:** A product may be advertised as a good deal, limited-time only bargain, or as an exclusive offer. The product could be a gadget, concert tickets, or holiday package. Sometimes the "seller" may ask you to pay for delivery charges or duties in cash.

**Protect:** Check for authenticity of what is being advertised when a deal seems too good to be true. Fake "sellers" often provide little details or information on the deal. These offers also usually ask for bank transfers, or cash payment terms. Insist on using the platform's secured payment options.

## **Warning Signs of A Scam**

#### 1. Tempting Offers

You see a good bargain, deal, offer that is way below market prices.

#### 2. Unexpected Friend Request

You get an online friend request from an unknown person.

#### 3. Pay by Gift Cards

You are asked to pay for service or product with gift cards or shopping credits.

#### 4. Urgent Money Transfers

You are asked to make urgent funds transfers.

#### 5. OTP Requests

You are asked to reveal your OTPs (One-Time Passworkds).





T TO SCAMS

#### WhatsApp Account Scam & Takeover

**How:** Scammers can hack into your social media accounts including WhatsApp and take over your accounts.

They usually do so to reach out to your contacts by asking them to send them money or buy things from them or cleverly trying to get your personal information by posing as you.

**Protect:** Turn on the two-factor authentication (2FA) in WhatsApp.

You can recover your account with WhatsApp. Email WhatsApp at support@whatsapp.com with the header "Lost/Stolen: Please deactivate my account" in the text body. You can reactivate your WhatsApp with a six-digit code that will be sent to your phone number.

If your social media accounts have been hacked, inform your family, friends and contacts immediately. This helps to prevent your contacts from acceding to any requests made by the hacker such as transferring money, buying things or sharing personal details for hackers to access other accounts.



#### **Internet Love Scam**

**How:** Scammers create a fake profile online to meet targets online and gain their trust with promises of love and adoration. After some time interacting with the target, scammers may share a story about an accident, falling on hard times or proof of love and request for money to be sent. Once money is transferred, the scammer may ask for more money or disappers.

**Protect:** Scammers may give excuses when you ask for a live video call or win over your trust by sending small gifts. Do not send any money to anyone you have not met in person. Verify the identity of the person you are talking to with an online image search (images.google.com).

Make a Police Report online (eservices.police. gov.sg) or in person at the nearest neighbourhood police centre.





#### NO PHYSICAL BIRTH OR DEATH CERTIFICATES FROM 29 MAY

From 29 May, the birth and death registration processes will be made digital and no physical certificates will be issued.

Parents can register their child's birth through the LifeSG application and download the digital birth certificate via an ICA e-service on ICA website or via MyICA Mobile application. Next-of-kin of the deceased can receive a digital death certificate from My Legacy portal (https://mylegacy.life.gov.sg) after the death is certified by a registered medical practitioner.

Citizens who are unable to go online or need help with the digital process can call a temporary dedicated 24-hour hotline at 6589 8707 for assistance. They may also visit the ICA Building and the network of ServiceSG Centres located across Singapore for assistance.

## SALARY INCREMENT FOR CIVIL SERVANTS

About 23,000 civil servants will receive salary increases of 5% to 14%. The salary adjustment will take effect from 1 Aug this year.

Officers in the Management Executive Scheme (MXS), Management Support Scheme (MSS) and Corporate Support Scheme (CSS) will receive adjustments of 5% to 10% with higher adjustments for grades that have larger gaps with market benchmark. Those under the Operations Support Scheme (OSS) will receive higher adjustments of 6% to 14%.

# CPF INTEREST RATES REMAIN UNCHANGED FOR 1 JUL TO 30 SEP 2022

Central Provident Fund (CPF) members below 55 years old earn up to 2.5% interest in their Ordinary Account (OA) and up to 5% per annum on their special and MediSave Account

(SMA) for the third quarter in 2022. They will also earn an extra 1% interest on the first \$60,000 of their combined balances (Capped at \$20,000 for OA).

CPF members aged 55 and above can earn an extra 2% interest on the first \$30,000 of their combined balances and an extra 1% interest on the next \$30,000. This means that they can earn up to 6% interest on the first \$30,000 and up to 5% on the next \$30,000.

Interest rates quoted are on a per annum basis. The extra interest will go into member's Special Account (SA) or Retirement Account (RA). For more information on CPF interest rates and their computation, please visit cpf.gov.sg/ CPFInterestRates.

## **AUTO-CHECK OUT BOOKS AT THE NATIONAL LIBRARY**

Those visiting the National Library can borrow books more easily with the "Grab-n-Go" pilot at the Study Lounge on the fifth floor. Visitors must first scan their identification card of the National Library Board e-Card at the gantry to enter the lounge. They may select up to eight books and exit the area by carrying the books in their hand. The gantry will automatically detect and check out the books using ultra-high radio frequency identification technology.

The Marine Parade Public Library is closed until 2025 as part of the wider rejuvenation of the Marine Parade Community Building where the library is located. The Central Public Library, located in the basement of the National Library building on Victoria Street will be closed from 13 Jun until the first half of next year. Both libraries will be overhauled for an upgrade.

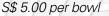
